At a ceremony in November South Dublin County Council reaffirmed its commitment to supporting education accessibility through its 'Access to Third Level Education Bursary' programme.

This initiative, launched in partnership with the Institute of Technology Tallaght (now TU Dublin) in 2006, aims to alleviate financial barriers for students from disadvantaged areas, encouraging them to pursue higher education.

Fifteen students were honoured this year, including eight first-year students beginning their academic journey and seven second-year students who had successfully completed their first year with support from the programme.

Each recipient received €2,500 for the 2024/2025 academic year. Additionally, a runner-up student who joined TU Dublin through its Access Programme was awarded a special grant recognising their hard work and dedication.

The programme highlights the long-standing partnership between South Dublin County Council and TU Dublin, showcasing the impact of collaborative efforts to empower young people and promote equal opportunities in higher education.

Dementia Café in Ballyroan

As part of the on going Dementia Inclusive Pilot that is taking place in Rosemount, Ballyroan, a dementia café in Ballyroan Community and Youth centre was launched on 8 October. The launch was attended by representatives from

Cheeverstown Trustus Senior Care and members of the local community. Some attendees had family members with them with a dementia diagnosis and some who expressed an interest in learning more about dementia as they had friends or family members with the diagnosis.

The café will run monthly on the second Tuesday of the month at 1:30pm and will be assisted by Cheeverstown volunteers. It is planned to have some focused activities or presentations at each monthly café and staff from Ballyroan Library attended the November café to demonstrate the magic table resource that is now available to book in the library.



The dementia inclusive pilot came about initially as a result of a motion that council owned-buildings display the Understand Together sticker in their buildings. Further analysis by the community department showed that a whole community-based approach was required involving local community members and businesses in collaboration with the local authority to establish what a dementia inclusive community could look like. Ballyroan was selected as the first pilot area in South Dublin.



The 2024 Community Endeavour Awards were held in the Plaza Hotel on 3 October. The awards recognise and reward community effort and achievement.

Post covid, the council has been conscious of the efforts of many individuals and community organisations to mobilise and start investing in their communities. We have supported many of these groups to ensure their schemes are sustainable and inclusive.



The Community Endeavour Awards provide an opportunity for community groups and organisations to have their work and their achievements celebrated collectively.





Teresa O'Brien was awarded the Community Endeavour Award for Outstanding Contribution to a Community. Teresa has been a community activist in Tallaght for over fifty years.

She was a member of the committee which helped to fund raise for Dominic's Community Centre and she has actively campaigned for community resources for her entire career. Teresa has been the driving force for almost every community initiative in the Dominic's/ Avonbeg area. The success of Dominic's Community Centre is a testament to her commitment.



SDCC Delivering Climate Action

Introduction

The Climate Action Plan 2024-2029 was approved by the Councillors of South Dublin County Council in early 2024 and includes 129 actions related to energy and buildings, transport, flood resilience, nature-based solutions, circular economy and resource management and citizen engagement. The plan seeks to increase energy efficiency by 50%, reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 51%, build climate resilience, and engage the community.

Energy Update

Achieving the targets of the CAP will require a significant reduction in energy use. An Energy Management Team has been established to progress ISO 500001 certification, an internationally recognised standard that demonstrates SDCC's commitment to continual improvement in energy management.

Transport Update

Smarter Travel Mark

With support from the National Transport Authority the Council is working towards achieving the Smarter Travel Mark, which recognises and celebrates organisations that support active and sustainable travel on the commute and beyond for their workforce and visitors, resulting in a reduction in single person car usage while increasing active and sustainable travel.

Decarbonising our Fleet

In 2024 SDCC continued to transition our fleet vehicles away from existing diesel vehicles to help meet our climate action targets. To achieve this transition SDCC aims to introduce more electric vehicles and alternative fueled vehicles into the fleet. In 2024 the council began a pilot trialing Hydrotreated Vegetable Oil in our diesel vehicles. This will be done as an interim measure to allow sufficient time for our EV charging network to be implemented and to research an alternative fuel source for our larger fleet vehicles.

Flood Resilience

SDCC is taking steps to make a flood resilient county. These steps come in small measures like gully maintenance and in large measures like a Flood Alleviation Scheme (FAS).

Gully Maintenance

In 2024 South Dublin has continued to review its gully maintenance plans. These plans will have a heavy focus on improvements to gullies and operations taken on gullies with known reoccurring issues. To date in 2024 South Dublin has cleaned out 2,957.6 tonnes of waste from gullies which will reduce chances of flooding in the urban environment.

Poddle Flood Alleviation Scheme

The River Poddle, which runs through South Dublin, has flooded frequently in the past causing millions of euros of damage and putting lives at risk. Work commenced on the Poddle Flood Alleviation Scheme in April 2024. The 36 month programme will protect 900 homes and 50 commercial properties in a 1 in 100-year flood, once it is completed.

South Dublin County Council is leading on the River Poddle Flood Alleviation Scheme in collaboration with Dublin City Council and the Office of Public Works.

Nature Based Solutions

The Council is leading the way in environmental innovation by adopting nature-based solutions to tackle urban biodiversity challenges. One standout initiative involves the use of the Miyawaki method to create mini-woodlands in urban areas, fostering sustainable habitats while engaging local communities.

This initiative has seen active collaboration between South Dublin County Council and local community groups. Together, they have transformed previously underutilised plots into thriving ecosystems, contributing to the county's broader goal of promoting sustainability and climate. To date over six South Dublin County sites, approximately 17,800 native saplings have been planted. An estimated 15,700 native saplings will be planted over the 2024/25 planting season (November - March) in six other locations in the County. Already, the first site planted in Sean Walsh Park in 2021 displays impressive growth, with many of the trees over four metres in height!

Circular Economy and Resource Management

By adopting a circular economy, SDCC aims to reduce waste and ensure materials are used as efficiently as possible. Reducing waste and ensuring materials are used as efficiently as possible.

SDCC staff work closely with contractors to reduce waste. For example, single-use beverage cups have been eliminated from the staff canteen for some years and a deposit and return cup system was relaunched. Drinking water fountains have been installed across South Dublin as a measure to reduce the amount of single-use plastics going to waste and to support active travel options. Currently there are 26 drinking water fountains in the public realm in South Dublin.

Community Engagement Update

Funding from Phase 1 of the Community Climate Action Programme has seen 28 projects supported through Strand 1 and 1a of the programme, totalling over €1.1m worth of climate investment in local projects.

A range of community organisations, from sports clubs to scouts, and charities to social enterprises have received funding to take climate action that has impact.

South Dublin County Council invites applications for the Tourism Event and **Festival Grant 2025**

Applications for the 2025 Tourism Event and Festival Grant will be accepted from January 2025. This annual grant scheme supports organisations and event planners hosting public events or festivals within South Dublin County's administrative area.

The grant aims to foster innovative events that enhance South Dublin's tourism offering, and strengthens the local visitor economy. Supported events focus on key areas such as culture, food, sports, hobbies, and activities.

The maximum grant available is €7,500, with funding amounts linked to projected attendance, including both local and international visitors.

With the recent adoption of South Dublin's Tourism Strategy, it is our mission to promote tourism development across the County. This scheme enables event organisers to bring new events that will have a positive impact on tourism growth and the broader South Dublin economy.

€391 Million Council Budget Approved for 2025

A budget for 2025 with proposed expenditure totalling €391,942,200 was approved by the Elected Members of South Dublin County Council at our annual budget meeting on 14 November 2024. This budget reflects the needs of a County that continues to develop and grow, with all the associated service demands and infrastructure requirements which that brings.

The first budget of the new Council term seeks to provide opportunity for all by enhancing key services and local quality of life, addressing the critical challenges of housing, climate action and economic development, and supporting continued investment in infrastructure across the County. It features a range of increasing resourcing to improve the impact of key public services including:

- Over €26.6 million for housing maintenance to ensure appropriate and efficient service levels for an expanding housing stock, including continued planned maintenance funding and extra provision for reletting of vacant properties.
- **€6.97 million** for facilities and services to respond to local and regional homeless challenges and to support households to exit homelessness.
- **€24.9 million** for maintenance of footpaths, regional and local roads.
- **€24.1 million** for management, maintenance and development of parks, pitches and open spaces, including almost €4.6 million for tree maintenance, with extra funding once again provided to deal with emergency and remaining legacy works outside the tree programme schedule.
- €13.3 million for litter management and cleansing.
- €12.3 million for community, sports and wellbeing initiatives and grants.
- **€27 million** for the regional fire service.

The most significant level of funding in the budget is to support the provision of social homes through Approved Housing Bodies and long-term leasing, with plans for expenditure of almost €104 million in this regard.

Funding is also continued for various initiatives to progress our Climate Action Plan, particularly through continued investment in retrofit works to improve the energy efficiency of Council-owned buildings, funding the transition to Hydrotreated



Vegetable Oil from diesel for all our large vehicles by Q1 2025 and continued transition to Electrical Vehicles (EVs) for smaller vehicles throughout the year, along with additional climate action related operational, community, adaption and innovation programmes.

Economic and tourism development, along with quality infrastructure and placemaking, all support ongoing investment and future prosperity in South Dublin and, for 2025, commercial rates are being maintained at existing levels, the vacancy rate refund credit is being reduced to 0% to strongly encourage occupancy of vacant commercial and industrial premises, while €2.9 million will be spent on traffic signal, bridge and regional road improvement programmes along with €1.9 million for further enhancements in our towns, villages and public realm. We are also providing over €1.6 million to support management and promotion of the extended Grange Castle Business Park and significant funding is also ring-fenced for the 12th Lock Masterplan (€1.5 million) and projects under our Tourism Strategy (€1.3 million). In addition, we will continue with our Business Support Fund and other supports for small and medium businesses through our Local Enterprise Office and working in partnership with South Dublin Chamber. We are also providing €300k for the operation of the Work IQ Innovation Centre in Tallaght and €100k for an economic plan for Rathfarnham Village in conjunction with the proposed Rathfarnham Castle / Stables project.



Community and voluntary work, together with our investment in social and cultural amenities and programmes, provide a better quality of life and wellbeing in the County and this is recognised in our community, sports, and libraries programmes all of which are being expanded in 2025. Specific provisions of note include €3.1 million to complete local parks upgrades at St. Cuthberts, Quarryvale, and Jobstown and for continued investment in teenspaces and playgrounds, while €2 million will be spent on pitch improvements, new astro pitches, sports pavilions, and storage facilities in parks and €1 million is earmarked to support management of community centres. We have also increased the libraries' book fund and have plans for additional cultural and artistic programmes with the Civic Theatre and Rua Red. We are bringing Tradfest events to South Dublin in January 2025 along with a range of seasonal festivals including for St. Patrick's Day, Halloween and Christmas and a programme of events for Parthalán Place in Tallaght.

Making the budget was a collaborative process with input from many Councillors and the outcome reflects and addresses key priorities for our citizens, including providing for inclusive, safe and sustainable communities, which is critical to underpinning quality of life and opportunity for all. Along with our commitment to the implementation of the Public Sector Duty Framework and ongoing work on housing adaptation grants, age friendly initiatives, Traveller inclusion and support, integration, sports inclusion, neurodiverse initiatives and many other programmes, extra funding is provided for accessibility works, a fund for a new equality and access work plan and a range of initiatives to support the introduction of the new Community Safety Partnership. In addition, specific projects requested by local Councillors include widespread roll-out of solar powered litter bins in town centres and parks, resources to tackle graffiti more effectively in local areas, a Columbarium wall and car park improvements at Bohernabreena cemetery, fit-out of new youth facilities in Citywest and Adamstown, family trails in Sean Walsh Park and Lucan House/Parco Italia, improvements to pedestrian crossings and local





road markings, enhanced cleansing of laneways and cycle tracks under the street cleansing service, examination of feasibility of additional sports facilities in Brookfield, Kingswood, Tymon, Collinstown etc. and a roll out of school streets.

The budget is largely funded by central government grants (40%), commercial rates (39%), and income from rents, loans, and service fees (13% combined), while Local Property Tax (LPT) currently accounts for approximately 3% of income. Our potential to expand key services and also to accommodate additional budget requests from Councillors while balancing the budget for 2025 was achieved despite the maximum 15% LPT reduction being applied by the Council at the October meeting. However, the ability to provide such discretionary extra measures in future budgets within the lifetime of this Council up to 2029 will be directly linked to the future LPT variation decisions.

Organisationally, we continue to expand our workforce to deliver the level of services committed to in this budget and to manage a significantly expanding capital programme. This is reflected by a 12.5% increase in payroll costs on the 2024 projected outturn as well as plans to improve our recruitment profile and processes. Corporate funding is also included for key organisational and workplace development initiatives, enhancing our connectivity with local communities and citizens, and other key corporate and governance measures including managing data access, cyber security, ongoing digitisation of services and debt management.

All of this means that the Council's budget for 2025 addresses a broad range of priorities that will allow us to effectively meet the needs of local citizens, communities and businesses in 2025, as well as providing the basis for greater opportunity for all in South Dublin under our new Corporate Plan over the next five years, as we seek to be a place that meets the needs and ambitions of everyone living, working and visiting here.

Recruitment at SDCC

2024 has been an exciting and productive year for the recruitment team. So far this year the Council has employed 140 members of staff and advertised 52 competitions.

We facilitated the employment of 93 Graduates in the four Dublin Local Authorities with nine Graduates taking up employment with South Dublin County Council across eight skills area. We partnered with Ballyfermot Training Centre to offer 12 candidates a General Operative Traineeship, with an opportunity for a six month temporary contract. We continued to maintain strong relationships with 3rd level institutes including TUD Tallaght and UCD facilitating paid and unpaid placements in the area of ICT and Planning; we also partnered with AHEAD and the WAM Graduate Programme. In August, we successfully trialled rolling recruitment for our Clerical Officer competition and later extended it to the General Operative campaign; we hope to continue this approach for suitable competitions.



We expect to advertise the following posts between December 2024 and the Spring of 2025 -School Wardens, Executive Parks and Landscape Officer, Traveller Housing Liaison Officer, Graduate Planner, Supervising Inspector Mechanical, Analyst Programmer, Bricklayer, Graduate Landscape Architect. Executive Biodiversity Officer. Inspector Electrical Architects. Professionally Qualified Social Worker, Graduate Engineer Mechanical and Assistant Engineer.

It encourages parks and green spaces to achieve high environmental standards and effective management, with awards based on eight key criteria. Additionally, Tymon Park and Waterstown Park received high commendations in the 2024 All Ireland Pollinator Award.





Speaking on the announcement, Colm Ward, Chief Executive of South Dublin County Council said; "Achieving Green Flag awards for five of our parks recognises our commitment to the continued development and management of high-quality parks and green spaces. It is great to achieve this prestigious award for our parks which are a haven for recreation and enjoyment by all.

I would like to particularly thank our Public Realm staff for their hard work and dedication which has been instrumental in securing these awards, supported by active and welcome involvement by community volunteers and local residents' groups."


What is Parthalán Place?

Be Winter Ready









Helping make you, your home and your business more resilient and prepared for severe weather

Severe weather challenges all of us. Activities that we take for granted can become difficult or even hazardous when severe weather occurs. However, by taking some simple steps you can reduce the impact of such events.

South Dublin County Council's Severe Weather Assessment Team (SWAT) meets in advance of all storms on foot of any Met Eireann Weather Warnings received. The SWAT is made up of senior staff from across the organisation. The purpose of the meeting is to assess the readiness of the council to deal with the upcoming storm and severe weather events and put in place preventative actions as required.

Under the Major Emergency Management Framework, the Council has the following plans:

- Major Emergency Plan
- Flood Emergency Plan,
- Severe Weather Plan, and
- Rest Centre Plan.

The protocols for severe weather are contained in the plans, and being actioned upon receipt of weather warnings from Met Éireann, are as follows:

Status Yellow: Be Aware - A general notification email is sent to relevant staff across the organisation-inspections of key infrastructure and equipment carried out by relevant departments.

Status Orange: Be Prepared - Triggers a meeting of the Severe Weather Assessment Team (SWAT) comprised of senior management across all departments, who discuss the issues particular to that weather event and agree the appropriate response/ action from each department.

Status Red: Take Action - this should be a comparatively rare event and implies that recipients take action to protect themselves and/or their properties. The SWAT team is now a Crisis Management Team and meets as often as necessary - hourly, twice daily, etc., depending on dynamics of the weather event, possibly over the conference call facilities. National and Regional Emergency offices are likely also being updated via teleconference at this stage to facilitate inter agency cooperation between the LA, HSE and AGS.

The 2024-2025 Winter Maintenance Plan includes information on the seven gritting routes and also on salt barns and the locations and availability of salt bins. The seven gritting routes and the associated gritting truck can also have a snow plough attached if this is required. The Council has seven gritting trucks and seven snow ploughs.
