About the Chief Executive's Report

South Dublin County Council's Chief Executive's Report is presented to elected members at Council every month and details important achievements across our various departments whilst highlighting key statistics and images from events that took place that month.

The report also highlights major news pieces and puts a focus on an area of the Council that doesn't always get the attention it deserves.

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Wellington Lane Cycling and Walking Scheme

he Council is launching a final phase of non-statutory consultation for the Wellington Lane scheme. The consultation will run during December and January and the information in the public domain will consist of a virtual consultation room and includes an animated fly-through of the proposed scheme, the options report and drawings.

Information will also be placed out on the street to ensure local people are fully aware of the consultation and have the chance to feed into the process. The scheme, which extends west of the Spawell Roundabout and runs along Wellington Lane, Wellington Road and

Whitehall Road, terminating at the Kimmage Road West junction. The route includes key links for pedestrians and cyclists to the primary schools located along Rossmore Road and Limekiln Road. The primary objectives of the overall scheme are:

- Provide improved cycle and pedestrian facilities along the route,
- Enhance connectivity for the surrounding residential developments to key trip attractors,
- Improve modal shift for walking and cycling within the area for all users.

The informal consultation will allow the Council to finalise a final design to progress a Part 8 planning application.



Wellington Lane A non-statutory consultation will run during December and January.

BusConnects Phase 2

Brand new bus links have been introduced around Adamstown Station, Hazelhatch Station, Lucan, Leixlip and Celbridge. Bus-Connects Phase 2 went live on 28 November 2021 and is introducing several new local routes which will significantly increase bus coverage serving more areas, with better frequency. The C-spine routes are very frequent routes made up of individual bus services that are timetabled to work together linking several villages and towns with the city centre. Built Heritage Scheme

It was another very successful year for grant projects being funded under the Built Heritage Investment Scheme (BHIS) 2021. The BHIS is funded by the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage and is administered by the Council's Architectural Conservation Officer.

The allocation for the Council under the scheme for 2021 was €72,000 which saw an increase of €12,000 from the allocation provided in 2020. South Dublin County Council invited owners of Protected Structures and buildings within Architectural Conservation Areas to apply for funding during January 2021. Seven projects under BHIS have been completed with two properties in Architectural Conservation Areas being provided funding towards conservation repairs and reinstatement of architectural features. The total cost of the works completed under BHIS projects for 2021 amounted to €171,511.18 with €99,511.18 in private leveraged funds.





Parking Bye-Laws

The South Dublin County Council (Control of Parking) Bye-Laws 2021 were made by resolution of the Council in May 2021 These provide revised locations for paid parking and standardise hourly rates and times. In addition to already established Pay and Display locations, new areas have also been created as set out in the agreed Parking Bye-Laws in Clondalkin, Palmerstown, Rathfarnham and Tallaght.

Housing, Social and **Community Development**

Council Call for Proposals for Uncommenced Residential Developments

outh Dublin County Council, along with various other local authorities, are seeking to enter into advance purchase arrangements to secure turnkey homes, in particular, for affordable housing within developments ranging from 10 to 150 homes in size. Homebuilders and housing developers are being asked to consider offering homes (houses or apartments) with planning permission, where construction has not yet commenced, to local authorities under an advance purchase turnkey arrangement.

This call, under the government's Housing for All plan, seeks to support accelerated delivery of hous-

ing especially to provide affordable homes for eligible applicants in South Dublin with such homes supporting the Council's Housing Delivery Action Plan 2022-2026. The Council may enter into an advance purchase agreement for any homes offered or agree to the direct sale of homes by the developer to an eligible purchaser nominated by the Council while joint venture arrangements that include an Approved Housing Body (AHB) will also be considered.

Deerpark Centre

On Tuesday 16 November, Mayor Peter Kavanagh officially re-opened the Deerpark Community Centre in Deerpark Estate, Tallaght following refurbishment and upgrade works jointly funded by Circle Voluntary Housing Association and the Council. The refurbished facility provides residents with the opportunity to be more involved in the management of their living and social environment with a local meeting place as well as dedicated space for Foróige Tallaght Youth Services to support local youth development work as well as educational and other activities for young people.

New Traveller Accommodation

Proposals for the construction of a new Traveller-specific housing development at Fonthill Road were presented to the Lucan-Palmerstown-North Clondalkin Area Committee in November.

The innovative development will comprise seven new 'A' rated energy-efficient homes with five four-bedroom and two three-bedroom two-storey houses including a dedicated play space for children and is being progressed under the Council's current Traveller Accommodation Programme 2019-2024.

The Part 8 planning application will be published in December and with the opportunity for public consultation and submissions up to the end of January in respect of the proposals submissions which will be available at County Hall, Tallaght, Civic Offices, Clondalkin and online on the Council's Consultation Portal.

Deerpark Community Centre has been officially re-opened.



Social Inclusion Festival

Mayor Peter Kavanagh virtually launched the sixteenth Social Inclusion Festival "Staying Connected" which ran from 15 -21 November with more than 75 online/ live events taking place over the week. Highlights of the week included a Family Fun Day at Café Aon Scéal, Anti-Racism Talks from Black and Irish, film workshops for young people with Down syndrome and an LGBT+ film night amongst more.





Grange Castle Conservation and Pocket Park **Development Wins CEF Construction Excellence** Award 2021

he works undertaken on the Grange Castle Conservation and associated Pocket Park development have been recognised with a Construction Excellence Award 2021.

The aims of the project were to conserve and stabilise the condition of the Grange Castle historic building, and to improve the presentation of its site so that the Castle can be visited by members of the public and be positioned within a new park setting which will benefit both the client companies and their employees working within the Business Park, and the

wider community. The pocket park of approximately six acres includes new tree and grassland planting, new walkways, and landscape features.

The Park and Castle are within walking distance of the Grand Canal to the North, with well-used cycle paths and restored towpaths. The development was funded by South Dublin County Council in full and is considered a great example of a conservation project, along with the new Pocket Park, that provides a strong sense of place and highlights the historic features and views of the Castle with the existing and developing modern Grange Castle Business Park.

welve community-led projects have been selected by the public to be funded in the Tallaght Central Electoral Area through South Dublin County Council's landmark €300k Have Your Say participatory budgeting initiative.

Details of all twelve winning projects were announced on Thursday 2 December and are available on www.sdcc.ie. Work will begin on the projects early in the new year.

'€300k Have Your Say' is a participatory budgeting initiative that has been run by South Dublin County Council since 2017.€300k Have Your Say allows residents to develop project ideas for their local area and then vote on shortlisted proposals to fund winning projects up to the value of €300,000. Twenty-eight projects to date have been selected for funding in the Lucan, Clondalkin and Firhouse-Bohernabreena Electoral Areas.

The Council will run the initiative in every local electoral area in the County with the next area due to be selected by the Mayor in 2022.

New Teenspace at Ballycragh Park

he Mayor of South Dublin County, Cllr Peter Kavanagh officially opened the Teenspace and the extension to the playspace at Ballycragh Park in November.

The Council's Teenspace Programme commenced following countywide consultations with teenagers, to find out what their needs are and how those needs can be best met in SDCC's parks and open spaces. In Ballycragh, this has resulted in a teenspace that is located in a safe, high-profile location with plenty of seating and with access to large informal activity areas such as parkour and callisthenics. The 300K Have Your Say initiative run in this area in 2019 provided funding for an additional extension of facilities to the very popular Ballycragh playspace. The local community voted in large numbers to include an extended playspace for younger children.

The Mayor paid tribute to the local community at the opening for their support of the popular park and teenspace at Ballycragh Park, and the work of Council staff in managing the project and maintaining the teenspace and the playspace.

Have a Green Christmas

We consume more at Christmas than at any other time of the year, in fact at Christmas we produce 30% more waste than usual, and it can be difficult to know how to reduce it. This Christmas the Environmental Awareness Office is helping citizens to minimise their waste and have a generally greener Christmas. Remember to take your glass jars and bottles to any of the bottle banks located around the county to recycle them. Christmas is a very busy time for bottle banks as demand for the service is high. If the banks are full, please bring your bottles home with you and come back again.

Recycling Initiatives

Some very successful community recycling events were held last month. In collaboration with the Waste Enforcement Lead Authority (WERLA) Eastern-Midlands Region and with the aid of our Social Enterprise Partners, Recycle IT we ran our annual mattress amnesty and rolled out a time-limited pilot bulky waste collection service.

The mattress amnesty allowed householders to have their old mattresses recycled for free. This year we recycled 938 mattresses. Our partners Eco Mattress Recycling Ltd, break the mattresses down into their component parts with the steel springs sent for metal recycling, Polyurethane foam reused in the production of carpet underlay and cloth and synthetic fibres transferred onto industry as raw product for further processing.

Our pilot Bulky Wate Collection initiative proved popular amongst the public with over 400 enquiries for the service that supports the the removal of household bulk waste.

South Dublin County Council has been awarded five prestigious Green Flag Awards from An Taisce Environment Education Unit.

aterstown Park, Sean Walsh Park, Tymon Park, Corkagh Park and Rathfarnham Castle Park were all awarded prestigious Green Flags Awards at an announcement by the Minister of State with responsibility for Community Development and Charities, Joe O'Brien TD.

The Green Flag Awards are judged every year by a peer jury of green space experts, who volunteer their

time to visit applicant sites and assess them against strict criteria, including horticultural standards, cleanliness, sustainability, and community involvement. Public town parks, country parks, gardens, cemeteries, nature parks and green spaces are eligible for the award. In Ireland, the Green Flag Award for Parks Scheme has been enthusiastically received by park management as it delivers major wins for the delivery of quality green

Only awarded for exceeding tough environmental standards in green space management, and excellence of visitor attractions – the Green Flag Award Scheme is the mark of a quality park or green space and is recognised throughout the world. This year over 2,300 public sites in 16 countries around the world have achieved Green Flag or Green Flag Community Award status.

Mayor of South Dublin County, Councillor Peter Kavanagh, raised the flag on Wednesday 17 November 2021 at Rathfarnham Park, and said,

"The raising of the Green Flag recognises and rewards the provi-

sion of high-quality parks and green spaces. It is a great achievement for South Dublin County Council to have won such a prestigious award for Rathfarnham Castle Park and our other four award-winning parks. This award demonstrates the hard work of staff in the park in implementing the Council's parks management plan. The Park is a haven for residents in Rathfarnham especially in this time of Covid restrictions. Without our public parks and gardens, our lives would have been much further reduced and confined. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the hard work put in by park staff, and community volunteers and residents' groups."

Elected Members have adopted Budget 2022 which provides for approximately €282 million in expenditure on service provision, an increase of over 5% on the 2021 budget.

outh Dublin County Council will continue to deliver on key frontline services and exciting new initiatives in 2022 following the adoption of the Budget. The budget continues a yearon-year trend of increased investment in the future of the County. This budget will be augmented by the threeyear Capital Programme 2022 - 2024 of approximately €750 million (m) to be considered by elected members at the December Council meeting.

A priority of the Council's elected members is the retention and expansion, where possible, of frontline day to day services with an additional €4m provided in the budget. Through this, several service areas have been allocated extra resources including an additional

€429,000 for twenty seasonal public realm workers with a specific provision of €100,000 to deal with graffiti and back lanes. Approximately €10.3m is budgeted for litter management and street cleaning in 2022. An increase of €912,000 has been agreed in the fire services budget to €22.2m in total. Budgets for some key areas include:

- €101,829,000 for housing services,
- €34,800,500 for road • maintenance, public lighting, the provision of cycleways and more,
- €14,241,400 for water services, and,
- €50,494,700 for rec-• reation services, with €3.5m for the arts, €11m on libraries and €24m on parks, pitches and playgrounds.

A Focus on

Budget 2022

Commitment to housing

The budget of €101,829,000 allocated for housing services in 2022 represents an increase of €6,685,100 on the 2021 budget as our comprehensive build, purchase and leasing initiatives under the Capital Programme continue to meet and exceed targets. This includes €15,889,500 on maintenance for over 10,000 homes – with €1,400,000 further funding for our planned maintenance programme, an additional €1,000,000 for re-let works and to support rightsizing transfers plus €20,000 funding for a tenant smart heating pilot initiative with €5,729,800 allocated for housing welfare services, estate/ tenancy management, housing stock insurance and addressing anti-social behaviour. A further €9,305,500 will support the housing strategy, the housing construction programme, Part V and other housing delivery.



Delivering for our communities

Integration, health and wellbeing and quality of life are central to our approach to developing the County for our communities and we aim to build on our good progress in recent years through funding initiatives like,

- €2,192,800 for the Social Inclusion and Community Activation Programme,
- €500,000 to implement plans for St. Cuthbert's Park in Clondalkin.
- €201,500 Arts Office programme including childrens', vouth and community activities and festivals,
- €500,000 for the Teen Space Programme, and,
- €1m to progress new community centres in Newcastle and City West.

This year the Council will continue to provide for the Dublin Mountains Project, the Tallaght Innovation Centre, various Greenway projects, the expansion of Grange Castle and the Business Support Programme. The development of a Heritage Centre in Tallaght has long been an ambition of the Council and an initial budget of €1,000,000 has been provided for the exciting project.

A welcome budget

Presenting the budget, Daniel McLoughlin, Chief Executive of South Dublin County Council, said, "The Budget as presented is positive and makes best use of available resources, while mindful of ongoing challenges. It is vitally important to make a real difference in supporting communities, while advancing the development of the County."
