What is your career background?

Like many people, when I left school, I didn't know what path my career would take but I eventually found myself studying Planning in UCD and fell in love with the idea of making a difference to society and helping to shape the future direction of Ireland's urban landscape. With that, I started my career as a Town Planner, spending over 13 years working in Dublin City Council before joining South Dublin County Council in 2016.

My career in planning was a small bit unconventional, as I ended up working in a diverse range of areas, such as business model development, designing and introducing new Local Authority services, delivering digital transformation projects, managing infrastructure programmes, as well as working on large scale regeneration projects such as the Dublin Docklands SDZ and more recently the City Edge project.


Throughout my career, I've always sought to push myself to operate outside my comfort zone, to be exposed to new ways of working, not being afraid to make the odd mistake and most importantly to learn from it, whilst at the same time always looking to upskill and develop, whether this be through practical experience or further education. I recently took up the position of Director of Economic, Enterprise and Tourism Development, which is a great opportunity and there is a fantastic team in place to have a positive impact on the lives of South Dublin's citizens.

What does your role involve?

I am responsible for ensuring that the Economic, Enterprise and Tourism Development Directorate contributes to the achievement of the vision and strategic direction of South Dublin County Council. As a team we are doing this in so many different ways; through the delivery of our library services where we have seen the recent opening of two new libraries in Castletymon and North Clondalkin; actively supporting 3,652 LEO clients; managing Grange Castle Business Park and creating an environment for a further 10,000 jobs; promoting the tourism economy with the delivery of projects such as the Dublin Mountains Visitor Centre; supporting a vibrant Arts and Cultural sector in the County, as well as overseeing the redevelopment of Tallaght Stadium.

What are the most rewarding things about working for a local authority?

Undoubtedly, it's the positive difference you can make to people's lives. I've been in the privileged position to be able to do this in my career, whether this be by delivering projects

such as the dublinbikes scheme in the city where 90,000 people use this service on an annual basis or by working on the development of 9,000 homes and a new town in Clonburris for 23,000 people.

It's about making things happen and you get to work with some amazing people on truly great initiatives, whether this be the City Edge project, which will create a new place for 150,000 people to live and work in Dublin or the delivery of the new €14 million Tallaght Innovation Centre, which will have a transformational impact on the start-up sector in the Dublin region.

One of the most rewarding aspects relates to the collective accomplishment in achieving something as a team; learning from your peers every day; developing your skills and enhancing the performance of the Department where you work.

The further you develop, it also becomes more about developing others and supporting people with their career aspirations, as there is such a great sense of satisfaction in seeing other people grow and prosper in their own professional lives.

Why should someone consider a career with their local authority?

Local Authorities play a central role in delivering services to local communities, enhancing people's lives, and shaping the future direction of society, so by working in a Local Authority you can play an active role in bringing all of these different dimensions to life.

Not only do you get to work with some great people and to work on some fantastic initiatives; working in a Local Authority also provides a platform for you to really understand yourself and see what's important to you from a career perspective. Given the diversity of different Departments within a Local Authority, there are significant opportunities for you to be exposed to a variety of work environments and different areas of work. There is something there for everyone, it's just about finding it.

Innovation Week 2021 took place from 8 to 12 November. South Dublin County Council worked hard at organising a range of different events to showcase innovation across the organisation. This year the week focused on four different areas.

Citizen centric innovation

The presentations and videos at this event demonstrated how South Dublin County Council has sought to put citizens at the heart of the services we provide. Videos included for their innovative approach were from the new North Clondalkin Library and the Teenspace Project, and presentations on Cycle South Dublin and Climate Action.

Scale up innovation

The scaling up innovation event showcased successful innovations across our organisation to provide staff with the chance to learn from and mirror these successes in their own area. Projects included the Smart Mobility Hub, the development of the Staff App and the Pitch Booking system.

Transformative innovation

This was a panel event and explored what is required to anticipate changing needs and secure long-lasting transformation. Our Transformative Innovation event focused on three of our flagship projects which will change the landscape of South Dublin as a county. These projects are: HeatNet, CityEdge and Tallaght's Innovation Quarter.

Innovation culture

The final event of the week event saw the re-launch of the Lean Six Sigma programme and we are looking forward to this recommencing in 2022. Last but not least as part of innovation culture were the much anticipated staff awards. The three categories were innovation in citizen engagement, innovation in service delivery and innovation in the workplace. There was also one overall winner which was awarded to the IT Department for their implementation of remote working solutions during COVID-19.

These events were delivered both online and live streamed from the Rua Red Arts Centre. This year was the inaugural year of the staff awards, they were a great success and staff got hugely involved. We were out the door with nominations and 204 members of staff submitted votes online. This will now be an annual event so get your thinking caps on for the ideas you or your team could be nominated for next year. Overall Innovation week was a huge success with over 400 people logging on to the various events across the week.

Staff can now really involve themselves further in the innovation process through either the upcoming Lean Six Sigma and Digital Transformation Programme or through the South Dublin County Council Innovation Network.

Trans community "disproportionately affected by COVID"

On Saturday 20 November, Cllr. Peter Kavanagh, Mayor of South Dublin County Council, paid tribute to the county's Transgender community and said that they were disproportionately affected by the global COVID-19 pandemic. Mayor Kavanagh was speaking as he raised the Trans flag at County Hall in Tallaght to mark Transgender Day of Remembrance, when the victims of transphobic violence are commemorated.

"Trans people, especially young trans people, rely on their community for support. Lockdowns and restrictions have meant that accessing these communities hasn't been as easy, and has disproportionately affected trans people who don't get to be themselves outside of their community," Mayor Kavanagh said, "I am very grateful to South Dublin's LGBTQ+ Network for all the virtual events and support they have provided for trans people in our county, and I hope that we can all take note of their work. Trans people want to be themselves, and it's an act of common human decency to facilitate this."

Mayor Kavanagh also cautioned against the rise of transphobia in the media, saying, "I'm old enough to remember the debates around decriminalisation of



homosexuality, and it's upsetting to see the same tired talking points coming to the fore in Irish media today. Since 2015, trans people have had the legal right to be who they really are, and we don't need to ape other countries and platform discrimination and hate under the guise of concern."

Do you have an idea that you have seen elsewhere that could help us tackle climate change? Or maybe you have an idea that you haven't seen anywhere else?

Did you know that South Dublin County Council has a Climate Innovation Fund which anyone can apply to?

A €300,000 allocation was put in place in 2019 to support projects from any part of the local authority that demonstrate innovative approaches to managing the many challenges that climate change will present.

Staff are invited to submit innovative projects or ideas to the Climate Innovation Fund which can help us in tackling climate change. If you have a project or an idea please let us know.

To date a diverse range of projects have been provided funding. These include:

- Installation of drinking water fountains: In 2019 / 2020 funding was provided for the installation of drinking water fountains at strategic locations. The drinking water fountains were placed in prominent locations in village centres and parks to encourage active travel and to reduce the amount of single use plastic bottles. The water fountains have provided in excess of 42,000 litres of water to citizens since they were installed, this is equivalent to 84,000 plastic bottles(500ml).
- Climate Action Workshops designed for community groups were delivered in 2020 and 2021. The workshops presented participants with information and tools on how to make personal lifestyle changes to reduce and negate the impacts of Climate Change on their communities. The workshops were delivered in person at community venues prior to COVID-19 and subsequently were delivered online. The workshops presented community groups with opportunities to network and share ideas and experience
- Eco Driver Training is an advanced programme developed to train participants on driving techniques that will reduce engine emissions, reduce wear and improve road safety. The programme was run as a pilot course in 2019.
- Rehabilitation of Rural Hedgerows: This project was developed to re-establish the native hedgerows in Kiltipper Park. It is vitally important that we maintain and protect our native hedgerows as these are corridors for the movement of wildlife and the protection of biodiversity. The Green Infrastructure Strategy is mapping this type of infrastructure to help ensure its protection and the Climate Innovation fund has also made a contribution to this Strategy
- Roadside Pollinator Bulb Planting: These projects are huge biodiversity gains for the county helping pollinators and align with the policies in the Climate Change action

plan, the Biodiversity Action plan and the National Pollinator Plan. More than 290,000 pollinator bulbs were funded by the Innovation Fund.

- WeCount: South Dublin County Council have collaborated in the WeCount project with UCD by funding air quality monitoring equipment at schools in the county. The project empowers citizens to measure road traffic and air pollution in their own neighbourhoods. WeCount is a European citizen engagement project with case studies in six cities: Dublin, Cardiff, Barcelona, Madrid, Leuven and Ljubljana. Citizens and community groups within each city are provided with low-cost sensors that count heavy vehicles, cars, bicycles, pedestrians and air pollution at the street level. Data collected will be used to provide evidence of the need of sustainable mobility policies around schools, such as the 30km/h speed limit around schools, the School Zone initiative, etc.
- Grand Canal Lighting Upgrade Funding was provided through the Climate Innovation Fund to upgrade 4000 SOX lamps. The upgrade resulted in significant energy savings. It also allowed minimum lighting level when there is no human presence to benefit wildlife.
