

Accessibility



Accessible Tallaght Stadium

Since 2008 South Dublin County Council has been a member of the European Observatory: Cities and Town for All. The European Observatory is a forum, which was created out of the Barcelona Declaration, to encourage and support cities and towns to share best practice in accessibility.

The extensive access works and initiatives which we have undertaken over the past 13 years, in particular, have all been focused on removing the barriers that create disability and exclusion and creating a truly Accessible South Dublin County.

Tallaght Stadium strives to provide an accessible environment for all its guests. Wheelchair access is available at the Stadium, for Health & Safety applications **MUST** be processed through the Managers Office and approved prior to your visit. All applications for wheelchair access should be directed to the Managers Office at the Stadium. For more information please contact reception at 01 420 3033.

Accessibility spaces are located in both the East and South Stands. There are designated accessible parking bays beside both the Block 4 & 5 turnstiles. Patrons with accessibility requirements can gain entry into the ground via the gates beside blocks 4 & 5. On arrival, please present at your designated entry point where a steward will organise access via the designated gate.

Council Buildings

A significant amount of access works have been carried out since 2005 on a variety of Council public buildings. For example:

County Hall, Tallaght:

County Hall is fully wheelchair accessible. It has Braille and tactile way finding signage and all public service points are fitted with hearing induction loops. Transit wheelchairs are available at three key locations around the building and accessible toilets are located throughout the building. We also have a changing places toilet located on the ground floor. The customer care centre has two lower level counters and a Braille machine and Zoom text facility are available on site. All public entrance doors have been automated. There are seven accessible parking bays available to disabled drivers/passengers.

Civic Offices, Clondalkin:

The Civic offices are fully wheelchair accessible. All public service points are fitted with hearing induction loops and a transit wheelchair is available from reception. All public entrance doors have been automated and two accessible parking bays are available to disabled drivers/passengers in the rear car park.

South Dublin County Library Network:

All South Dublin County libraries are wheelchair accessible and are fitted with hearing induction loops and Braille and tactile way finding signage. South Dublin Libraries are delighted to present a range of assistive resources and supports available for use in our branch libraries. This purpose-built toilet facility gives disabled people and assistants more space and the right equipment to take care of personal hygiene, in safety and comfort.



- Age Friendly Housing and Rightsizing
- Rightsizing means finding a home that's right for you now and in the future. This might mean moving to a smaller home or somewhere on one level. Under our Housing Delivery Action Plan 2022-2026, the Council, together with Approved Housing Bodies (AHBs) expects delivery of up to 600 high-quality, new age friendly homes to support older people to age in place and live independently for longer in their own communities.
- There are new age friendly homes in Sallymills, Templeogue Village, St. Marks and Maplewood / Fernwood, The Weir and Brady's Field. In addition, design teams are in place for new developments at St Aongus Green, St Ronan's Crescent, Pearse Brothers Park and Sarsfield Park with these homes due to commence in 2024. Allocations have commenced for the initial homes becoming available with properties advertised through Choice Based Letting and Rightsizing applications are being progressed from both social housing tenants and private homeowners.







THE 7 PRINCIPLES

Principle 1: Equitable Use

• The design is useful and marketable to people with diverse abilities.

Principle 2: Flexibility in Use

• The design accommodates a wide range of individual preferences and abilities.

Principle 3: Simple and Intuitive Use

• Use of the design is easy to understand, regardless of the user's experience, knowledge, language skills, or current concentration level.

Principle 4: Perceptible Information

• The design communicates necessary information effectively to the user, regardless of ambient conditions or the user's sensory abilities.

Principle 5: Tolerance for Error

• The design minimizes hazards and the adverse consequences of accidental or unintended actions.

Principle 6: Low Physical Effort

• The design can be used efficiently and comfortably and with a minimum of fatigue.

Principle 7: Size and Space for Approach and Use

• Appropriate size and space is provided for approach, reach, manipulation, and use regardless of user's body size, posture, or mobility.

HOUSING ADAPTATION GRANT

Housing Adaptation Grant for People with a Disability Scheme

The Housing Adaptation Grants Scheme for disabled people is available to assist in the carrying out of works that are necessary for the purposes of rendering a house more suitable for the accommodation of a disabled person who is a member of the household.

Mobility Aids Housing Grant Scheme

The Mobility Aids Housing Grant Scheme is available to fast track grant aid to cover a basic suite of works to address mobility problems, primarily, but not exclusively, associated with ageing. This Scheme is also for the disabled person who is a member of the household.

Housing aid for Older People Scheme

The scheme is available to assist older people (over 66 years of age) living in poor housing conditions to have essential repairs or improvements carried out such as re-wiring, re-roofing and the provision of central heating (where none exists).

Tenant Disabled Persons Grant


The scheme is available for Council tenants who require alterations to be carried out to their Council home to assist with their disability needs.

Advisory / Consultative Panel

- The South Dublin County Disability Advisory and Consultative Panel was established in January 2010. It is a joint initiative between South Dublin County Council (SDCC), and disabled people who live or work in the County.
- Our function is to advise SDCC on key issues that are relevant to the lives and interests of disabled people in the County; and to have both an advisory role and a consultative role (as appropriate) to developments in the County that are led by the Council.
- The Panel is voluntary and we meet monthly.







FETTERCAIRN HORSE PROJECT

Equine Assisted Learning

- The Fettercairn Youth Horse Project continues to work on advancing our involvement in Equine Assisted Learning and Equine Therapy in an effort to produce a Therapeutic Programme to present to potential users. Quite a number of groups with physical, sensory and / or intellectual disabilities attend at Fettercairn; these have included Dyspraxia Ireland and Cheeverstown House. Individuals also attend for private one to one sessions and typically these are children on the Autism Spectrum.
- The Fettercairn Youth Horse Project has also facilitated researcher Dr Caren Hession in carrying out a series of research projects from September 2012 to the present (Oct/Nov 2015) into Equine Therapy.

Therapeutic Horse Riding Improves Cognition, Mood Arousal, and Ambulation in Children with Dyspraxia

Abstract

Objectives: The objectives of this study were to evaluate the effects of the physical motion of a horse (riding therapy) combined with the audiovisual perception of this motion on a group of children with dyspraxia in terms of cognition, mood arousal, and gait variability.

Design: The study design was a pretest/post-test.

Settings/location: The study was conducted at the Fettercairn Youth Horse Project, Fettercairn, Tallaght, Dublin. Subjects: Forty (40) children ranging from 6 to 15 years of age with a primary diagnosis of dyspraxia were the study subjects.

Interventions: Children meeting inclusion criteria participated in six 30-minute horse-riding sessions and two 30-minute audiovisual screening sessions.


Outcome measures: A Standard Progressive Matrices test (also known as the Ravens test) was used to measure aspects of general intelligence. A Childhood Depression Inventory (CDI) questionnaire was used to assess cognitive, affective, and behavioral signs of depression. A GAITRite Pressure Mapping System analyzed foot function and gait variability by measuring single and double support, cycle time, cadence, toe in/out, and stride length. Results: Significant improvements were evident on the Ravens test and the CDI by the end of the study period. The amount of both single and double support required while completing the walking task also was significantly reduced. Improvements were visible on toe in/out values, cycle time, and cadence. Changes in stride length did not reach statistical significance.

Conclusions: These findings support the theory that riding therapy and/or the perception of beat-based rhythms, as experienced by the rider on the horse, stimulates cognition, mood, and gait parameters. In addition, the data also pointed to the potential value of an audiovisual approach to equine therapy.
