Grange Road Active Travel Scheme Openina

On Friday 13th January 2023, Mayor of SDCC Cllr Emma Murphy, Minister for Transport Environment, Climate and Communications Eamon Ryan, and Director of LUPT Mick Mulhern officially opened the Grange Road Walking and Cycling scheme.

This scheme cost approximately €3.5M and was delivered by South Dublin County Council with funding provided by the National Transport Authority.

As part of the Greater Dublin Cycle Network Plan, Grange Road Cycle Scheme Phase 2, constructed 725m of upgraded pedestrian and cycle paths. This will lead to much improved safer walking and cycling facilities in particular for local schools in the area.

The scheme was launched just outside the gates of Gaelcholaiste An Phiarsaigh. In attendance was Cllr Yvonne Collins, Cllr Ronan McMahon, staff of SDCC Active Travel team, a representative of the National Transport Authority, AECOM, Wills Bros Ltd. and members of the Dublin Cycling Campaign. Staff members and students from Loreto High School Beaufort and Loreto Grange Road Primary School were also attendance.

Bridge Inspections and Maintenance

The Council has recently completed a comprehensive set of engineering inspections of some 160 bridges and culverts located along the public road network within the county as part of the Bridge Asset Management Project (BAMP).

The purpose of the inspections was to produce an inventory of structures and then ascertain the current condition rating of each and identify any defects which may require remedial works. The inspections were carried out using an app developed by the Road Management Office (RMO) and the data is recorded on the Pavement Management System, a map-based software package used for the management of the road network within the county.

The work identifies several bridges where maintenance works should be carried to ensure full health and safety levels are achieved and the team is now working to progress the necessary detailed surveys and designs.

This information will used to carry out repairs and the rehabilitation of the most critical structures which is expected to commence in Q3 of

Development Management update from 2022

2022 saw some significant changes tinued, with the launch of the Citizen' Portal, came into effect on 17 December 2021, processes will continue in 2023. and 2022 saw the first applications under this scheme being received by the Council.

This scheme saw responsibility for decision making on residential developments of 100 housing units return to the local planning authority for the first time since 2017. In addition, new legislation introduced statutory deadlines for the processing of compliance submissions received by the local authority, a new process was developed for dealing with compliance submissions with just over 600 compliances assessed and determined by the team in 2022.



Active Travel funding allocation from the NTA for 2023

The NTA have agreed to fund this Council €22,065,000 to support the delivery of new and improved walking and cycling infrastructure during 2023, which is an increase from the €18.9m that was allocated to the Council for 2022. This funding will be used to support the delivery of the Council's ambitious Cycle South Dublin programme of work.

The funding will be used to progress the onsite delivery of several projects including phases 4 and 5 Dodder Greenway, Wellington Lane, Clonburris Southern Link Street, Grand Canal to Lucan Urban Greenway, Castletymon and the D24 neighbourhood cycle network, Templeville and Limekiln Road. The funding will also be used to progress the planning and design for new routes including from Tallaght to Clondalkin, Citywest to Rathfarnham.





Local Amateur Stars Honoured at Sports Awards

The long-standing sponsorship by the Council and South Dublin County Sports Partnership of the Echo's annual Amateur Sports Awards continued with a ceremony last month in the Plaza Hotel, Tallaght.

Deputy Mayor, Cllr. Joanna Tuffy was present to announce the overall individual and team winners for 2022 with Tallaght sprinter Rhasidat Adeleke, who won two individual monthly awards during the year and is now Texas-based, named Sports Star of the Year with her mother present to collect her prize, while Castle Golf Club were named Team of the Year for their local and national exploits.

The event, returning to an in-person format, also acknowledged the monthly individual and team winners throughout 2022 with a range of rising and accomplished stars and teams of the previous 12-months present.





Launch of New Pool Pod at Clondalkin Leisure Centre

Mayor of South Dublin, Cllr. Emma Murphy officially launched Clondalkin Leisure Centre's new Pool Pod in January.

Funded through South Dublin County Sports Partnership and the Active Cities Dublin project, the Pool Pod is a welcome addition to the centre that is designed to help users with limited or impaired mobility by offering dignified and independent access to the swimming pool with ease.

It replaces traditional pool hoists to enhance local health and wellbeing through improved community access and inclusivity at the pool. Our Mayor was joined in Clondalkin by Sean Reid, local centre user, and centre staff on Thursday 19th January to celebrate this launch.

New South Dublin Older People's Council Launched

Following a thorough consultation process with older people living in the County in recent months, the newly refreshed South Dublin Older People's Council held their inaugural meeting on 13th January, with Mayor of South Dublin, Cllr. Emma Murphy, and Colm Ward, Director of Housing, Social and Community Development, in attendance.

The OPC comprises members from older persons' groups across South Dublin with representatives from active retirement groups, men's sheds, community day care groups and various other local organisations.

Its representatives will participate on the multi-agency South Dublin

County Age Friendly Alliance to prioritise key objectives and through its new five-year work plan, supported by South Dublin County Councils Age Friendly Programme and the national Age Friendly Ireland service, it will:

- IMPROVE the lives of older people in South Dublin County.
- INFLUENCE decision makers and service providers.
- Be the VOICE for older people in matters of concern to them.
- Have an INPUT to decisions being made about older people.
- Create countywide LINKS and NETWORKS.
- Provide INFORMATION relevant to older people.



Housing First

As part of the Dublin Region Homeless Action Plan, the Council provided 26 new "Housing First" tenancies in 2022, exceeding our target of 23 for the year and contributing to plans for a total of 1,319 such tenancies over the period 2022 to 2026 under the Housing First National Implementation Plan.

Housing First forms a key part of the progression from long-term homelessness through a comprehensive approach involving permanent housing, case management and a programme based on recovery for people experiencing mental health, physical health, substance misuse, social, behavioural, and other challenges.





Templeogue Décor Paint a Beautiful Picture with New Shopfront

Paint, wallpaper and decor experts Templeogue Décor have been awarded €1,000 in recognition of the work undertaken to transform the shopfront design of its business premises.

The family run business in the heart of Templeogue Village received €1,000 from the Council under the annual Shopfront Grant Scheme. The award of Best Designed Shopfront was in addition to a grant received to part fund the installation of an improved shopfront design.

Congratulating the local shop on the win, Mayor of South Dublin County, Cllr Emma Murphy said "The vision shown by Nicola and her colleagues, and the improvement made, is fully deserving of this fantastic award. The Shop Front Grant Scheme provides an excellent opportunity for local businesses to enhance the aesthetics of their stores and encourage the preservation of our beautiful villages. I would encourage all business owners in our villages to engage with South Dublin County Council and make use of this valuable service."

The annual Shopfront Grant Scheme provides grants for shopfront improvements ranging from painting updates to replacing an entire shopfront. Grants are available for a maximum of 50% of overall costs. Furthermore, a prize of €1,000 is awarded for the Best Designed Shopfront.

Local Enterprise Office South Dublin Now Supporting Over 279 Small Business and 1,401 Jobs According to New Figures

Last month, Minister for Enterprise, Trade and Employment Simon Coveney TD, announced the annual results of the Local Enterprise Offices (LEOs) for 2022 which showed that Local Enterprise Office South Dublin supported companies created 259 jobs in 2022. This figure was up significantly from the 242 that were created by LEO South Dublin in 2021.

The net jobs created by Local Enterprise Office South Dublin supported clients in 2022 was 102, which takes into account companies that amalgamated, ceased trading and those that transferred on to Enterprise Ireland.

The new figures show that the LEO South Dublin financially supported 279 small businesses in their portfolio across the county these companies in turn employ 1,401 people.

The total national figures for the Local Enterprise Offices across the country were announced with the LEOs now supporting 37,863 jobs across 7,221 companies. In 2022 there were 7,870 new jobs created by LEO clients' companies with a net jobs creation figure of 3,447. This was up 10% nationally on 2021.From the jobs created, 84% were outside of the Dublin region.

The Local Enterprise Office were delighted to host a lunch for LEO Clients on the 12th January. The theme for the event was 'Resilience in our personal, sporting and entrepreneurial lives' and our guest speakers were Jenny Egan, World Champion canoeist and local coffee roaster Daniel Horbat speaking on the topic followed by lunch and a chance to catch-up with other local businesses.

Lucan Library hosts The Art of Reading Book Club led by Colm Toibin, Laureate for Irish Fiction

Lucan Library were selected to host the first 2023 session of the Art of Reading Book Club on Wednesday 11th January, funded by the Arts Council of Ireland.


In an Art of Reading event, Laureate for Irish Fiction Colm Toibin meets with a different library book club each month to discuss Irish fiction, contemporary and classic, usually while interviewing the author.

In January's session which Lucan Library hosted online, Colm Toibin was in conversation with Eimear McBride, author of the award-winning book A Girl is a Half-Formed Thing. When published in 2013, A Girl is a Half-Formed Thing won numerous awards, among them Irish Novel of the Year.

To support the event, South Dublin Libraries purchased multiple copies of the book to make it available for book club members, and there was a great response from the public. It was an exciting start to Lucan Library's event calendar.

31 people attended the online talk to gain insight into Eimear McBride's approach to this book and why she chose the particular voice and style of writing. The Q&A session at the end reflected the audience's interest in and engagement with these literary events.

Lucan's keen readers were delighted to be offered such a wonderful opportunity to build on their regular and committed library activity. We look for-



ward to hosting further events of such calibre throughout 2023.

4 Dublin Local Authorities help schools get their waste Sorted!

The 4 local authorities in Dublin have come together with the environmental charity VOICE Ireland to deliver a project which will help schools manage their waste better.

The 'Sorted - How to Reduce, Segregate and Manage School Waste' videos aim to assist schools to reduce waste and improve waste segregation.

Two informative video guides have been created to share best practice from Irish primary and secondary schools. Both videos were filmed at Howth Road Mixed National School, Dublin 3. Video one is designed for staff and outlines the basic principles of a school waste system. For example, it explains how and where to install bin stations. The video outlines how schools can encourage sustainability and circular economy on their campus. The circular economy aims to keep materials and products in-use for as long as possible.

Examples that have been proven to work in Irish schools include uniform swaps, book rental and reusable water bottles initiatives. Video two is designed to assist a pupil led environmental or Green-Schools committee seeking to improve recycling rates and tackle unnecessary waste in their school.

Turning the sod for new Astropitch at Sean Walsh Park.

On Monday 16th January 2023, the Mayor of South Dublin County Council, Cllr. Emma Murphy officially turned the sod for the new Astro Pitch at Sean Walsh Park, Old Bawn. The Mayor was joined by Mr. Daniel McLoughlin, Chief Executive, Cllr Charlie O'Connor, Ms. Teresa Walsh, Director of Services, along with staff of South Dublin County Council and guests to celebrate this event.

Speaking at the event Mayor Cllr. Emma
Murphy said:

"The provision of this facility delivers a key part of the Astro Pitch Programme and helps deliver South Dublin's Sports Pitch Strategy.

The provision of facilities will support the further development of Sean Walsh Park and complement the facilities at Tallaght Stadium; in line with South Dublin County Councils aim to support and promote the health and wellbeing of the people of South Dublin County."

This project is funded by the Department of Housing Local Government and Heritage through the Urban Regional Development Funds which support 'Project Ireland 2040' and is also supported by the Astro Pitch Programme in South Dublin County Council's 3-year capital budget.

New Pump Track in Dodder Valley Park

On Monday 23rd January 2023, the Mayor of South Dublin County Council, Cllr. Emma Murphy officially turned the sod for the new BMX Pumptrack at Dodder Valley Park, Mount Carmel. The Mayor was joined by Ms. Teresa Walsh, Director of Services, Staff of South Dublin County Council and guests to celebrate this event.

The provision of these facilities is part of the plan which was agreed by the council for Mt Carmel in Dodder Valley Park and provides facilities for an increasingly popular sport. The project is funded by South Dublin County Council's 3-year capital budget and the Department of Tourism Culture Arts Gaeltacht Sport and Media via a sports capital grant.

Speaking at the event Mayor Cllr. Emma Murphy said: "The provision of this facility is part of the Dodder Valley Park-Mount Carmel recreation plan, which has already seen the completion of a 400-metre grass athletic track and a football pitch, both currently in their

establishment phase. This BMX pump track will be the first of its kind built by South Dublin County Council and we look forward to its provision in Dodder Valley Park."

Aecom Ltd are design consultants on

the project and it is being constructed by Trailbreaker Ltd in collaboration with Velosolutions Ltd. It is currently under construction and will be completed in the coming months.



Council to spend €1.8 Million on improving our Public Realm and open spaces in 2023.

The draft programme of minor improvement works in the public realm has been presented to the elected members at the January meetings of the four area committees of the Council

The draft programme this year consists of 80 schemes including schemes for the provision of new footpaths and footpath improvements, public lighting schemes in open spaces, improvements to accesses to open spaces and parks, improvement to parks and open space boundaries, landscaping of roundabouts and small planting schemes.

A substantial increase in the budget provision for this programme of works has been made to account for inflation increases as well as exceptional increases relating to the price of steel and other construction materials. The

draft programme of works will be presented to the elected members of the Council at the monthly meeting in February, following which implementation of the schemes will commence.

The list of proposed schemes has been compiled from improvement requests received from Councillors and members of the public, as well as works that have been identified as necessary by staff.



Local Authority Call for Proposals for Un-commenced Residential Developments

'Housing for All - a New Housing Plan for Ireland' is the government's housing plan to 2030.

It is a multi-annual, multi-billion euro plan which will improve Ireland's housing system and deliver more homes for people with different housing needs.

It is an objective of South Dublin County Council (SDCC) to create sustainable communities by encouraging a mix of mixed tenure (i.e. affordable and social) and mono tenure (i.e. affordable or social) housing.

South Dublin County Council is seeking to increase the avail-




ability of affordable and social housing through various delivery mechanisms including through advance purchase arrangements with home builders and housing developers.

In this call, home builders and housing developers are being asked to consider offering properties with planning permission, where construction of the development or a phase of a development has not yet commenced, to local authorities under an advance purchase

turnkey arrangement, with payment on completion, primarily for affordable housing purposes.

Please note that the requirements under Part V of the Planning and Development Act 2000 as amended will apply in the normal way to all proposals.

Temporary closure of Sean Walsh Park car park and bottle bank to facilitate works at "The Weir" Whitestown Way Tallaght

Cunningham Contracts Group continue to progress the construction of 81 social housing units for older persons at Whitestown Way, on behalf of Clúid Housing Association in partnership with South Dublin County Council.

The works have been delayed by Covid restrictions, but it is now anticipated that they will be complete by the end of 2023.

As part of the Planning Permission grant, the following upgrades to the area south of the Housing Development were noted:

- An upgrade to the entrance to Seán Walsh Park from Whitestown Way.
- An upgrade of the existing carpark
 area

Following discussion with South Dublin County Council an updated layout for this area has been agreed which incorporates these upgrades and additional landscaping works between the Whitestown Way stream and the Southern boundary of the development.

These upgrades will ensure that vehicular movements and cycle and pedestrian permeability are facilitated and enhanced upon completion of the development.

To facilitate the Proposed Landscape works it will be necessary to close off public access to the Seán Walsh Park Carpark for the duration of the works. Pedestrian access to the park and onward to the Old Bawn Community School will be maintained via the relocation of the existing "kissing gate" as indicated below.



The Contractor will relocate the existing "kissing gate" during week commencing 9th January 2023 and once these works have been completed the Seán Walsh Park Carpark will be closed. It is anticipated that the "kissing gate" relocation will take a week to complete, and that the car park will be closed with effect from 8.00AM Monday 16th January 2023

The bottle bank located within this area of the park will also be temporarily removed for the duration of these works. The nearest bottle bank locations to Sean Walsh Park are located at The Square Shopping Centre Tallaght (1.4km), South Dublin County Council HQ (1.7km), Tallaght Leisure Centre (1.7km), Killinarden Heights SDCC Housing Maintenance (2.0km) and Ahearne's Public House Car Park (2.0km).

Once the Carpark is closed the Contractor will then extend his hoarding to secure the site and progress the works.

Full access to the Seán Walsh Park Carpark and the surrounding upgraded landscaped areas will again be available to the public at the end of November 2023.

This, along with other initiatives, should ensure the Council delivers a high quality 24/7 online customer service for the people of South Dublin County.

The plan sets out how we will meet the challenges of climate change by delivering 154 climate action initiatives, an increase of 29 on the 2022 target, while continuing to improve the appearance of the County and promote it as a destination for tourism

Among the targets we have set for the year ahead are planting 2,500 trees across the County, upgrading 1,600 public lights to LED and providing €300,000 in business supports. We will seek to grow the membership of our libraries to 58,000 people, after an incredible 2022.

The Council adopts a Service Delivery Plan with specific targets based on the objectives in the five-year Corporate Plan. Each local authority's performance is benchmarked annually by the National Oversight and Audit Commission, and South Dublin County Council identifies our performance improvement targets based on this benchmarking. We report on the delivery of the previous years' Service Delivery Plan in that vear's Annual Report.

The draft Annual Report for 2022 which will include reports on the 2022 performance will be presented to the Council for adoption at the April Council Meeting.

The 2023 Service Delivery Plan will be presented to the Council for adoption at the February Council meeting. All previous Service Delivery Plans and Annual Reports are available on the Council's website, www. sdcc.ie Copies are also available on request from your local library.

Once the 2023 Service Delivery Plan is adopted by elected members, it will be posted to the Council's website and social media channels.

deliver 2,600 homes in 2023.

Alongside this the Council will work to support the diverse needs of local communities through targeted housing such as Age Friendly homes as well as initiatives such as the Healthy County Framework, Age Friendly Strategy, South Dublin libraries service, arts and sports strategies, and other areas.


