About the Chief Executive's Report

South Dublin County Council's Chief Executive's Report is presented to elected members at Council every month and details important achievements across our various departments whilst highlighting key statistics and images from events that took place that month.

The report also highlights major news pieces and puts a focus on an area of the Council that doesn't always get the attention it deserves.

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Land Use, Planning and **Fransportation**

Dublin 24 Rapid Build Cycle Network

he Council has started work on a new Active Travel project, called the Dublin 24 Rapid Build Cycle Network. This project would see the quick delivery of a segregated cycle network along several key routes in the Dublin 24 area. The project would deliver a safe and functional network providing a safer cycling environment. This network would include approximately 11km of cycle lanes and would have direct links with 9 schools. The key routes identified will consist of:

- Killinarden Heights
- Killinarden Way
- Whitestown Way
- Kiltipper Way

- Firhouse Road West
 - Killinniny Road
- Ballycullen Roadd/Drive/Avenue

The type of work includes a combination of temporary/quick build measures, such as bolt-down kerbs, planters and line markings as well as new hard infrastructural measures.

Design work is now underway, and the Council intends to start public consultation in September/October this year to start works on site in early 2023 and complete the full 11 kilometres of works in 2023. The project is funded by the National Transport Authority and due to the innovation and speed of delivery, this project has the potential to be identified as National Pathfinder Project.

Pedestrian Crossings

The Council has secured funding from the National Transport Authority to deliver improvements that will facilitate accessible and safe crossing points for pedestrians and cyclists at key locations throughout the County. Signal-controlled crossing points will be installed at the following locations:

- Kiltipper Way near its junction with Firhouse Road
- Junction of Belgard Road and Cookstown Road
- Lower Lucan Road, near Stewarts Care Facility
- Killinarden Heights outside Hearts FC
- Hayden's Lane near its junction with Esker Road
- Esker Road near its junction with Hayden's Lane
- Woodford Walk outside Castleview Road

These works have been designed, and procurement of the works is now underway. Installation is expected to commence in July 2022 with all sites operational by October 2022.

Adamstown Regeneration

Through the Urban Regeneration and Development Funding (URDF), the Council has committed to the delivery of three largescale infrastructure projects within the Adamstown Strategic Development Zone; Adamstown Plaza, Central Boulevard Park, and a civic building. The Council secured funding approval in June 2022 of €9.97 million from the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage and it is intended to commence delivery of the Adamstown Plaza in August/Septembe. The planning and design of the Central Boulevard Park and civic building projects will commence later this year.





City Edge Project

The non-statutory City Edge Strategic Framework, a joint initiative between South Dublin County Council and Dublin City Council, has been prepared and sets out a high-level strategy for the regeneration of the City Edge area to 2070. The framework was noted by both Councils at recent meetings and, along with all supporting studies, will be available to the public on the www.cityedge.ie website.



Traveller Accommodation

A new Traveller Accommodation development of seven group houses at Fonthill Road was approved by the elected members at the June Council meeting.

This will see two-storey, three- and four-bedroom homes, including one medically adapted home, being developed on a small site located off the N4/Fonthill Road North slip-road in Palmerstown West to provide permanent accommodation provided for local Traveller households currently living on an adjacent, informal Traveller development.

The new development forms part of proposed new accommodation delivery under the Council's Traveller Accommodation Programme 2019-2024.

116 New Social and Affordable Homes Approved for Clonburris

t the June Council meeting, the elected members of the Council approved the Part 8 proposal for the first phase of housing on Council-owned land within the Clonburris Strategic Development Zone (SDZ). This project, located within the Canal Extension development area of the SDZ, will see the delivery of 116 new social and affordable homes in a mix of terraced/semi-detached, houses, duplexes and apartments over two to four storeys, along with associated car parking, cycle parking, landscaping, drainage works and a new roundabout on Bawnogue Road that will serve as the entrance to the new development.

The approval of the proposed development follows a public consultation process from March to May which saw 92 submissions received from residents, statutory bodies and others about the development. In response to submissions some of the homes have been removed or re-designed, with some additional car parking provided and there is also a commitment to consultation with residents' representatives to inform the design of a proposed new play space at the intersection of the new development with the adjacent Ashwood estate.

It is expected that Council-led developments within Clonburris SDZ will deliver over 1,600 social, affordable purchase and cost rental homes throughout the Council's Housing Delivery Action Plan 2022-2026.



Social and Affordable Homes 116 new social and affordable homes will be delivered in the Clonburris Strategic Development Zone.

Saggart Community

On Thursday 23 June, Mayor Peter Kavanagh, along with the Council's Chief Executive, Daniel McLoughlin, and representatives from ML Quinn Construction Ltd., officially turned the sod to commence the development of a new community centre in Saggart Village. The overall project will be funded with €2 million from the Council's Three-Year Capital Programme along with €500k grant funding from the Dublin Rural LEADER programme. The new community facility, incorporating conservation and upgrade works to the former St. Mary's schoolhouse building along with a new extension, to be managed by a local Board of Management.





MacUilliam Family Day

Residents of MacUilliam estate, supported by the Council together with South Dublin County Partnership, Tallaght Gardaí and Barnardos, hosted a family fun day on Saturday, 18 June. Over 300 people attended the event with entertainment and activities organised for residents, and representatives of several local community and support organisations were also present to provide information on their services.

Economic, Enterpris **Tourism Development**

he Bí Gnóthach Student Enterprise Programme gives fifth and sixth class pupils a taste of the world of business and entrepreneurship through free resources, educational enterprise workshops, and the chance to create and set up their very own businesses in school.

The County Final was held in the Maldron Hotel, Tallaght earlier in the summer and there were over 175 pupils in attendance. The pupils displayed their business projects and explained their business idea to the judges. Their products were promoted and sold to their fellow students and within their communities with all profits made going to local and national charities.

The event included an award ceremony where the winners received medals presented by the Mayor's representative, Councillor Alan Edge. The overall winning project on the day was "Blixim Diaries" a business devised by students from Loreto Primary School.

Ruaille Buaille

Lucan Library hit the high notes this month with the return of the Ruaille Buaille Children's Music Festival. This annual festival is organised by Artscope on behalf of South Dublin Libraries and Arts. Lucan Library is always happy to take part in this celebration and this year was no exception. An art and crafts workshop was held in the library to invite local children to make bunting for the Festival Tent at the highlight event, Ruaille Buaille in the Park. Tutor Kim Jenkinson facilitated the workshop where the children created some bright, colourful bunting featuring musical notes and instruments. There was great excitement about their work being on display at the showcase event on Saturday 11 June in Griffeen Valley Park.

Lucan Library also hosted two live music sessions with musicians Malachy and Anita for the very young library members, aged 0-4. Featuring the violin, double bass and guitar, Malachy and Anita performed songs that had their young audience joining in with actions, as well as singing along.

Cruinniú na nÓg

Ireland is the first, and only, country in the world to have a national day of free creativity for children and young people under 18. Cruinniú na nÓg is a flagship initiative of the Creative Ireland Programme's to enable the creative potential of children and young people.

Cruinniú na nÓg South Dublin 2022 programme had something for everyone. On Saturday 11 June, children and young people came together to celebrate Ireland's National Day of Youth Creativity. There were both live and virtual events for children, young people, and families.





Summer Outdoor Markets

The return of the Urban Picnic to Corkagh Park in June and the addition of the Tymon Park Food and Craft Market this year have provided additional reasons to visit two of the county's biggest parks this summer. With over 30 food and craft stalls, and lots of family entertainment provided, there is sure to be something for everyone at these family friendly events. Both events are free and continue each Saturday from 11am.



New Mayor and Deputy **Mayor Elected**

t the Annual Meeting of South Dublin County Council held on Friday 24 June 2022 in County Hall, Tallaght, Councillor Emma Murphy (Fianna Fáil) representing the Firhouse -Bohernabreena Electoral Area was elected Mayor of South Dublin County.

The election of Councillor Murphy is a landmark moment for the State as she becomes the first LGBTQ+ woman elected to the office of Mayor in the Republic.

Councillor Murphy was proposed for Mayor by Councillor Shane Moynihan (Fianna Fáil) and was seconded by Councillor Alan Edge (Independent). Following a roll

call vote, Councillor Murphy was deemed elected to the Office of Mayor.

Councillor Joanna Tuffy (Labour) representing the Lucan Electoral Area was elected Deputy Mayor. Councillor Tuffy was proposed as Deputy Mayor by Councillor Pamela Kearns (Labour) and seconded by Councillor Laura Donaghy (Green Party).

Tributes were also paid to the outgoing Mayor, Councillor Peter Kavanagh (Independent) and the Deputy Mayor, Councillor Laura Donaghy (Green Party), who thanked their fellow Councillors, Chief Executive, Daniel McLoughlin and the management and staff of the Council for their help and support during their term in office

Woodland Playground at Rathfarnham Castle Park opens in June

he Council is currently upgrading theplay facilities in Rathfarnham Castle Park with an additional €50k being invested into the natural woodland playground.

Natural playgrounds provide greater opportunities for kids to engage in active play, explore the environment, and improve their physical fitness. They also stimulate children's imagination and creativity, help develop motor skills, improve their social skills, and provide an opportunity for nature study.

The upgrade will allow children to make up their own games and play themes while promoting active recreation opportunities. The new playground equipment is in keeping with the green surroundings of the woodland with natural materials being used. The new equipment consists of a 30 metre zip line that weaves between the trees, balancing beam bridge over the stream, natural climbing frame, tree top seats and associated landscape works. The existing playground equipment will be revamped to provide additional play value.

It is expected the playground will be fully completed by the start of June.

Sporting Facilities

Did you know there are over 167 playing pitches in South Dublin County for various sporting clubs such as rugby, Gaelic football, camogie, hurling, soccer, cricket, rounders, softball and athletics? These pitches serve approximately 60 sporting clubs, with over 1,000 teams using the pitches weekly. Playing pitches are allocated on an annual basis and this is done through our new online pitch allocation system at www.sdcc.ie.bookapitch. Pitch usage data collected from the system is then used to inform the Council's pitch maintenance schedule and capital investment programme.

Stop Food Waste

South Dublin County Council was delighted to support National Food Waste Recycling Week which ran from 30 May until 6 June 2022.. This new national campaign from MyWaste.ie encouraged people to recycle their food waste.

A previous study by the Environmental Protection Agency found that approximately 50% of household organic waste is being disposed of in the wrong bins. By segregating food waste correctly, it can be transformed into renewable energy and bio-fertilisers for horticulture and agricultural use.

Throughout the week, South Dublin County Council gave away 300 kitchen caddy kits to the residents of the County to help them segregate their food waste.

300k Have Your Say Results





Twelve community led projects funded for the Rathfarnham Templeogue electoral area through €300k Have Your Say.

welve community-led projects have been selected by the public to be funded in the Rathfarnham Templeogue Electoral Area through South Dublin County Council's landmark €300k Have Your Say participatory budgeting initiative.

Details of all twelve winning projects were announced on Thursday 30 June and project updates will be given on each on www.sdcc.ie/haveyoursay.

Work will begin on the projects in the second half of the year.

Forty projects to date have been selected for funding in the Lucan, Clondalkin, Firhouse-Bohernabreena and Tallaght Central Electoral Areas. The Council will run the initiative in every local electoral area in the County with the next area being Tallaght South in 2023.

Participatory Budgeting

South Dublin County Council were the first local authority in the country to introduce participatory budgeting when the Council launched €300k Have Your Say in 2017. To date, over 13,000 people have cast their vote in €300k Have Your Say to fund a project, or projects, of their choice. 949 project ideas have been submitted to the Council for consideration with 104 being put forward to the public vote and 52 being funded.

Previous iterations of €300k Have Your Say has seen the launch of a heritage trail app, the restoration of King John's Bridge in Griffeen Park, native apple trees planted throughout Clondalkin and the development of a sensory garden in Tymon Park.

'€300k Have Your Say' is a participatory budgeting initiative that has been run by South Dublin County Council since 2017. €300k Have Your Say allows residents to develop project ideas for their local area and then vote on shortlisted proposals to fund winning projects up to the value of €300.000.

outh Dublin County's newest public library in Castletymon has won the Cultural/Public Buildings Award at the Royal Institute of Architects Awards 2022 at a ceremony held in MoLl, Museum of Literature Ireland on 23 June 2022.

Designed by Henchion Reuter Architects, Castletymon Library opened to the public in September last year, a bright, bold building devised for the

community it serves.

Construction on the library began in 2019 with the handover of the new building taking place in June 2021.

Castletymon library features high ceilings and an open-plan main floor surrounded by large windows to let in an abundance of natural light. The feedback from the Tymon community has been overwhelmingly positive

Dublin Pride

The Dublin LGBTIQ+ Pride Festival is an annual series of events which celebrates lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer life in Dublin, Ireland. It is the largest LGBTQ+ pride festival on the island of Ireland. The festival culminates in a pride parade which is held annually on the last Saturday in June.

"Courage" was the theme of this year's festival with a commitment given the courage to call out and prevent acts of discrimination and violence towards the LGBTIQ+ community, and to stand with those affected by the events in Sligo in April this year., and members of the LGBTIQ+ community in Ukraine.



An Taoiseach, Micheál Martin TD, and the Lord Mayor of Dublin, Councillor Alison Gilliland. The Pride Parade was the first to take place physically since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020. The parade included over 13,000 people from 215 organisations and approximately 50,000 joined the march.





This month will see the Occupancy of the first homes at Kilcarbery Grange, Dublin 22.

his month sees the first households getting keys to their new homes in the South Dublin County Council-led development at Kilcarbery Grange in Dublin 22. This follows the commencement of construction in April 2021 by Adwood Ltd., a consortium of local builders, who partnered with the Council on the joint venture. The overall development will consist of 1,034 homes overlooking Corkagh Park, close to Clondalkin village and will include a new civic square, community building and creche facilities. So far, 301 of the homes are either under construction or complete and Adwood is also providing ongoing local social employment opportunities.

Social Homes

An initial 16 social homes have been allocated by the Council with at least 57 more social homes to be completed this year. A total of 310 social homes, funded by the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage, are to be delivered over four phases of the development up to 2025 comprising 41 one-bedroom apartments, 45 two-bedroom apartments, 93 three-bedroom houses, 11 three-bedroom duplexes and 20 four-bedroom houses.

Affordable Purchase

In addition, under the development agreement, 50 discounted homes will be made available for affordable purchasers with 16 three-bedroom duplex homes initially offered for sale earlier this year under a pilot affordable

purchase scheme agreed with the developer, supported by the DHLGH Affordable Housing Fund. Selected applicants are progressing towards completing purchases of the first affordable homes in South Dublin County in over a decade, at prices between \leq 245k and \leq 285k based on household incomes and mortgage capacity. Further affordable purchase opportunities in the Kilcarbery development are expected later this year.

Cost Rental

Kilcarbery also features 74 cost rental apartments, managed by Túath Housing, that are currently being occupied by the first cost rental tenants in South Dublin County. This tenure is supported through the DHLGH Cost Rental Equity Loan, a scheme providing significant discounts on market rents for one- and two-bedroom apartments.



Site Masterplan

The terms for the residential development were originally approved by the Council in September 2018 under a section 183 land disposal to Adwood. This followed the Council's site masterplan and a competitive dialogue procurement process, with planning permission subsequently granted by An Bord Pleanála in December 2019.

The site is beside the recent Council-supported PPP development of 109 social homes at Corkagh Grange. Along with the 434 social, affordable purchase and cost rental homes outlined above, 600 further homes will be delivered by Adwood for private sale with initial sales currently being completed.

Site infrastructure works were funded through the national Land Infrastructure Housing Activation Fund (LIHAF) and significant creche and community facilities to be provided in later phases of the development. Mature trees and hedgerows are retained as ecological corridors and green spines to complement the 16% green space of the total 70 acres while discreet bin stores are provided to manage the streetscape. An adjacent site is currently marketed by the Council for potential retail development while the feasibility of additional residential development on Council-owned lands to the north is also being explored.


