

### The Art of Being Normal (2015) by Lisa Williamson



# The Hunger Games (2008) by Suzanne Collins

# The London Eye Mystery (2007) by Siobhan Dowd




novel is highly recommended for first time fantasy readers.



### The Maze Runner (2009) by James Dashner




challenge yet, their physical separation. A moving novel from multi-award winner Sarah Crossan.




### A Good Girl's Guide to Murder (2019) by Holly Jackson




# Geek Girl (2013) by Holly Smale

As her old life starts to fall apart, will Harriet be able to transform herself before she ruins everything.




### Educated (2018) by Tara Westover


## Things A Bright Girl Can Do (2017) by Sally Nicholls

### **Guard Your Heart (2021) by Sue Divin**


